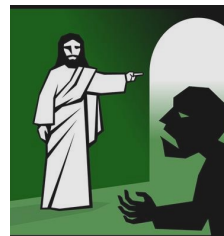
SECOND READING

A reading from the first letter of St Paul to the
Corinthians 1 Cor 7: 32 - 35

I would like to see you free from all worry. An unmarried man can devote himself to the Lord's affairs, all he need

worry about is pleasing the Lord; but a married man has to bother about the world's affairs and devote himself to pleasing his wife: he is torn two ways. In the same way an unmarried woman, like a young girl, can devote herself to the Lord's affairs; all she need worry about is being holy in body and spirit. The married woman, on the other hand, has to worry about the world's affairs and devote herself to pleasing her husband. I say this only to help you, not to put a halter round your necks, but simply to make sure that everything is as it should be, and that you give your undivided attention to the Lord.

GOSPEL

A reading from the holy Gospel according to Mark
Mk 1: 21 - 28

Jesus and his followers went as far as Capernaum, and as soon as the Sabbath came Jesus went to the synagogue and began to teach. And his teaching made a deep impression on them because, unlike the scribes, he taught them with authority.

In their synagogue just then there was a man possessed by an unclean spirit, and it shouted, 'What do you want with us, Jesus of Nazareth? Have you come to destroy us? I know who you are: the Holy One of God.' But Jesus said sharply, 'Be quiet! Come out of him!' And the unclean spirit threw the man into convulsions and with a loud cry went out of him. The people were so astonished that they started asking each other what it all meant. 'Here is a teaching that is new' they said 'and with authority behind it: he gives orders even to unclean spirits and they obey him.' And his reputation rapidly spread everywhere, through all the surrounding Galilean countryside.

REFLECTION

Evil Spirits versus the Holy One of God

The word 'diabolical' comes from a Greek word referring to something broken in two, shattered. Looking at persons and societies torn apart, it is obvious that the diabolical spirit is powerful. However, it harbours a fear that a more powerful Holy Spirit could reintegrate a personality, could make a community out of divided groups.

'Have you come to destroy us?' indicates that this fear was realised in the coming on to the scene of Jesus Christ. Jesus' answer was a resounding 'Yes', not in words but in action, healing a man torn apart by a diabolical spirit.

Jesus Christ invites and empowers us to join in his healing mission to overcome whatever it is which tears people apart, whether at the individual, community or global levels. We do so in the confidence of His Resurrection which overcame the diabolical tearing apart of His body and soul.

We could pause for a moment to commit ourselves to joining Jesus' mission, so putting the fear of God into the devil!

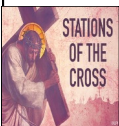

Why do we sing during Mass?

Why do we sing during Mass? The question has always been in the back of my mind, and yet I never put much effort into finding out why. Do we sing because that's what we've always done? Because we need something to fill the silence? Or is there a deeper meaning behind it?

And to answer that third question: yes, there is a deeper meaning behind it – one that can be found throughout the bible, from way back in the old testament to the letters of the apostles.

Paul himself had quite a lot to say on the matter, and though sometimes it's not always laid out plainly, he makes some valid points in regards to the connection between faith and music. So if you want to find out more, the bible is always there.

And amongst all this, there was one reason that really stood out for why we sing. When we sing we glorify God. Throughout the Bible we see people singing praises to God, but how does singing glorify God?

Well, singing is a powerful form of expression – an art – through which numerous people can come together. And like with most forms of art, we can use singing to highlight the greatness of our God. This is at the core of what makes singing a powerful tool for glorifying God. However, the mere fact that we sing in Church does not mean we are automatically glorifying or praising God.

In his letter to the Ephesians (5:18-20), Pauls writes, "be filled with the Spirit, addressing one another in psalms and hymns and spiritual songs, singing and making melody to the Lord with your heart, giving thanks always and for everything to God the Father in the name of our Lord Jesus Christ." He points out that we must make melody with our hearts, and this doesn't just mean that we let ourselves be pulled along by the music. It means that we use music to manifest our love for God, that by singing we are praising God not just because he is our God, but because we each have a deep and personal relationship with him. Singing for the sake of singing is not worship or glorifying, it's merely the act of stringing words together with an accompanying melody. When we sing along to the Mass hymns together as a community, not only do we grow our bond as a Church, but we also show that we know God. We show that we love him, and that we want to glorify him, not just because it is what is expected of us, but because in our hearts, we all want to.
