But he said, 'Why are you so agitated, and why are these doubts rising in your hearts? Look at my hands and feet; yes, it is I indeed. Touch me and see for yourselves; a ghost has no flesh and bones as you can see I have.' And as he said this he showed them his hands and feet. Their joy was so great that they could not believe it, and they stood dumbfounded; so he said to them, 'Have you anything here to eat?' And they offered him a piece of grilled fish, which he took and ate before their eyes.

REFLECTION

Ghosts, meals and humanity

When Jesus appeared to them, the disciples thought they were seeing a ghost, a sort of projection of a human image on the screen of the world but with no human depth and vitality. In fact, ghosts seem to drain life and warmth from those they encounter.

The disciples became convinced that they were in the presence of the Risen Lord Jesus Christ when he assumed a characteristic way of acting – sharing a companionable meal (of fish).

His bodily presence of *that* sort is now withdrawn from us. But we are now encountered by him in the Mass which has many dimensions, one of which is that of a sacred meal. When we share in the sacramental signs of his Real Presence in the Heavenly Bread and Spiritual Drink of Holy Communion, he brings us the life and warmth of the Risen Son.

In fact, he shares his very life with us, and because his life is gloriously fully human, we become less ghost-like as he heals those parts of our personality which drain goodness and vitality from the world.

We could take a moment to pray to take greater opportunities to share in the Real Presence of Our Risen Lord under the appearance of bread and wine. This will move us from the illusion of being alive to that vitality which is nourished by his glorified humanity.

Attaining Salvation

Attaining salvation is a key issue in Christian life. After all, a person can only achieve eternal life through salvation. But what is salvation and how can it be achieved? Salvation is God's act of grace in which we are preserved from the consequences of our condition of original sin i.e. a life after death eternally separated from God and His kingdom by remitting our sin and making us worthy of eternal life with Him. The act of grace which remits our sin is the death and resurrection of Jesus Christ. Jesus bore humanity's punishment for original sin and rose again from the dead so that humanity does not have to face eternal punishment for sin but can hope in eternal life as long as they believe that Jesus is the son of God who has come to preserve humanity from punishment from sin and 'give' salvation to humanity. Hence, it is this act of genuine faith in Jesus that is central to sinners attaining salvation, as St Paul makes clear in his letter to the Romans (3:21-25), "...but now the righteousness of God has been manifested apart from the law, although the Law and the Prophets bear witness to it- the righteousness of God through faith in Jesus Christ for all who believe. For there is no distinction: for all have sinned and fall short of the glory of God and are justified by his grace as a gift through the redemption that is in Christ Jesus, whom God put forward as a propitiation by his blood, to be received by faith,' But if we are saved by God's grace and our faith in that grace, then does that mean good works are irrelevant? Is it sufficient to join God's heavenly kingdom after death by asserting that we believe in Jesus as the Messiah and Son of God, regardless of how we have behaved in our lives? Absolutely not. Our faith must bring about personal transformation for us to be made righteous and live in God's grace, otherwise faith has no significance or power. This personal transformation is demonstrated by doing good works, and this is highlighted in a very famous passage from the epistle of James (2:14-20) 'what good is it, my brothers, if someone says he has faith but does not have works? Can that faith save him?....So also faith by itself, if it does not have works, is dead. But someone will say, 'You have faith and I have works.' Show me your faith apart from your works, and I will show you my faith by my works. You believe that God is one; you do well. Even the demons believe and shudder! Do you want to be shown, you foolish person, that faith apart from works is useless?' We can never be saved by good works alone because our own good works cannot get rid of original sin, which in itself would make us unworthy of eternal life with God. This is why God's act of salvation is necessary. But any faith in Jesus Christ needs to be demonstrated through good works and through our character, particularly in the way we treat other people. If genuine faith motivates us to do good works, then our faith will help us attain salvation. The Easter season invites us to bear witness to and believe in Jesus' resurrection as an act of salvation. But it is also important to think about how we all respond personally to this demonstration of God's grace.
