ENTRANCE ANTIPHON Ps 85: 1 -3

Turn your ear, O Lord, and answer me; save the servant who trusts in you, my God. Have mercy on me, O Lord, for I cry to you all the day long.

FIRST READING

A reading from the book of Joshua

Joshua gathered all the tribes of Israel together at Shechem; then he called the elders, leaders, judges and scribes of Israel, and they presented themselves before God. Then Joshua said to all the people: 'If you will not serve the Lord, choose today whom you wish to serve, whether the gods that your ancestors served beyond the River, or the gods of the Amorites in whose land you are now living. As for me and my House, we will serve the Lord.

The people answered, 'We have no intention of deserting the Lord and serving other gods! Was it not the Lord our God who brought us and our ancestors out of the land of Egypt, the house of slavery, who worked those great wonders before our eyes and preserved us all along the way we travelled and among all the peoples through whom we journeyed. We too will serve the Lord, for he is our God.

SECOND READING

A reading from the letter of St Paul to the Ephesians Eph 5: 21 - 32

Give way to one another in obedience to Christ. Wives should regard their husbands as they regard the Lord, since as Christ is head of the Church and saves the whole body, so is a husband the head of his wife; and as the Church submits to Christ, so should wives to their husbands, in everything. Husbands should love their wives just as Christ loved the Church and sacrificed himself for her to make her holy. He made her clean by washing her in water with a form of words, so that when he took her to himself she would be glorious, with no speck or wrinkle or anything like that, but holy and faultless. In the same way, husbands must love their

wives as they love their own bodies; for a man to love his wife is for him to love himself. A man never hates his own body, but he feeds it and looks after it; and that is the way Christ treats the Church, because it is his body – and we are its living parts. For this reason, a man must leave his father and mother and be joined to his wife, and the two will become one body. This mystery has many implications; but I am saying it applies to Christ and the Church.

COMMENTARY

Joshua's address to the assembly is a prophetic declaration: Thus says the Lord. He places before the people a choice: Whom will they says the blaces before the people a choice. Which will they serve? Three options are given. They can continue to serve ancestral gods and remain true to their past identity. They can opt for the gods of the people in whose land they dwell and hope to reap the blessings that accompany the land. Or they can worship the Lord, who is tied neither to their cultural past nor to their geographic present. They must make a choice from among all of the gods to whom they can commit themselves. Joshua's statement of choice is decisive: We will serve the Lord.

The responsorial psalm is the third part of the acrostic poem. The contrast between the just and the wicked is clearly drawn. God looks favourably toward the righteous; the fortunes of the wicked will be just the reverse. The psalmist knows that the theory of retribution is more a statement of faith in God's justice than an accurate more a statement of faith in God's justice than an accurate description of the circumstances of life. Good people do indeed suffer, but they turn to God in their pain and misery. Whether they are rescued from their affliction or not, they stand under the promise of God's loving presence. Because suffering is often seen as the result of alienation from God, assurance of God's nearness can alleviate the distress that such a misperception might cause.

This epistle addresses some of the responsibilities of husbands in a traditional patriarchal marriage. Although the passage opens with a recommendation for mutual subordination, the reading itself counsels wives who are told to be submissive, not husbands. The teaching is somewhat circular. First, marriage is seen as a metaphor for the relationship between Christ and the church. Next, this relationship becomes an analogy for marriage. Christ loved the church enough to give his life for it. This is the degree of spousal commitment envisioned for husbands. A second metaphor is used. In the Genesis account, the two are described as constituting one flesh. Husbands are identified with their wives, just as Christ is identified with the church. Marriage now characterises the mysterious union of Christ and the church.

In today's gospel, Jesus' words or deeds are met with disbelief by some of his own disciples. They were scandalised by what he said. Rather than soften the hardness of his message, Jesus responds to their challenge with one of his own. If they were troubled by the thought of him descending from heaven, what would they think about him ascending back to where he had been originally? Jesus further insists that the flesh (the human way of living) cannot give life, which the spirit can. Faith in lesus does not come easily not give life, which the spirit can. Faith in Jesus does not come easily or naturally. It is a grace given by God. While some of Jesus' followers have turned away, others have been convinced of the trustworthiness of his claims.

What's going on in Afghanistan?

In the past week, amidst the anticipating daily 11am Gladys updates on the COVID-19 situation in Sydney, there has been a news headline sparking global concern- President Ashraf Ghani has fled to Uzbekistan, giving the Taliban the opportunity to finally seize the capital city of Afghanistan (also known as Kabul) and effectively gaining control across the whole country. Why is this such a problem, and what can we do about it?

We will have to backtrack a little bit to understand who the Taliban are, and why there was a war in Afghanistan in the first place. The Taliban is an extreme Islamic group who ruled in Afghanistan from 1996 to 2001. During this time, they were able to consolidate their power and claim more territory through their oppressive regime. A small portion of the country still remained outside of their control, and most international nations never properly recognized them as a legitimate government. The United States military intervened to dispose of their regime in late 2001 after the tragic September 9/11 attacks on the twin towers, and promised Afghanistan support for a democratic regime instead. Even though the Taliban were no longer in control, they still regrouped in different parts of the country and continued to wage war against the United States and its allies, fueling a conflict which has been ongoing for several years. They've been able to gain back a lot of territory mainly because US and other western nations have withdrawn their forces in recent months. Kabul was the last major city the Taliban needed for them to claim complete victory. There has been widespread concern and uncertainty for what's to come, as their religious beliefs and brutality have left many Afghan people afraid, and desperate to leave the country. Suppression of non-Islamic activity is not uncommon there, and Pope Francis asked for prayers for the country, "I ask all of you to pray with me to the God of peace so that the clamor of weapons might cease and solutions can be found at the table of dialogue. Only thus can the battered population of that country – men, women, elderly and children – return to their own homes, and live in peace and security, in total mutual respect." The Christian community in Afghanistan is quite small, with only one Catholic Church and around 200 Catholics as of 2018.

The persecution of Christians in the Bible is something we have touched on in our youth group sessions- and it clearly still remains relevant today. We may be wondering how could God do this to his people, to cause even more suffering in this world? But we have to remember we can't understand everything from our finite perspectivewe don't have God's mind; we may never truly understand the details of why certain things happen; and even though suffering is most certainly not a good thing, the Bible points us in the right direction of trusting in God's power that he can use it to accomplish good (Romans 8:28 "And we know that in all things God works for the good of those who love him, who have been called according to his purpose.") So it is important now, more than ever, to pray for the protection of Christian believers and their families in Afghanistan (and even for other parts of the world where oppression is not making news headlines), to pray for their perseverance in overcoming difficulties and persecution, to pray for those who still work to evangelize despite the possibility of persecution and to pray for peace. The people of Afghanistan need our prayers.
