FIRST READING

A reading from the Acts of the Apostles
Acts 14: 21 - 27.

Paul and Barnabas went back through Lystra and Iconium to Antioch. They put fresh heart into the disciples, encouraging them to persevere in the faith. 'We all have to experience many hardships' they said 'before we enter the kingdom of God.' In each of these churches they appointed elders, and with prayer and fasting they commended them to the Lord in whom they had come to believe.

They passed through Pisidia and reached Pamphylia. Then after proclaiming the word at Perga they went down to Attalia and from there sailed for Antioch, where they had originally been commended to the grace of God for the work they had now completed.

On their arrival they assembled the church and gave an account of all that God had done with them, and how he had opened the door of faith to the pagans.

City Life for True Lovers

'Love one another as I have loved you.'
You may think that Our Lord's extravagant extreme of love in voluntarily undergoing death for us, is something no human being could ever measure up to.

But actually, something like this happens whenever a mother or father sits by the bedside of a child suffering the terrible pain of a chronic illness or traumatic accident and, perhaps, even facing the prospect of death. Such a parent will invariably say 'I would rather suffer and die than see my child suffer and die.' It is the same with a person seeing their much loved life partner in a similar situation.

Each of us, usually to a lesser degree and in less fraught circumstances, has the opportunity to absorb, to some extent, the sufferings of others. We are thus given the possibility of fulfilling the command: 'Love one another as I have loved you.'

The effect of this sort of loving will be realised at the end of history, not in a garden of Paradise, but as in a wonderful City where all tears will be wiped from our eyes.

We could pause for a moment on our way to that future City, resolving to be alert to opportunities to fulfil our Lord's command: 'Love one another as I have loved you.'

The Divine Mercy Chaplet

Many, if not all of you, have probably heard of the phrase "Divine Mercy" or even of the "Divine Mercy Chaplet." For me, the words were familiar, since I had heard them countless times, but if you had asked me to explain what the chaplet was, I'd have been hard pressed to give a good answer, other than maybe; it's a prayer you say using a rosary. However, the Divine Mercy Chaplet is much more than this. It is immensely important and incredibly nourishing from a spiritual standpoint.

To begin with, the chaplet finds its roots in the visions of St Faustina in 1935. To be brief, St Faustina received a vision of an angel, sent by God, to 'chastise a certain city,' but no matter how much she prayed for God to have mercy, her words seemed to have no impact. That is, until she had another vision, this time of the Holy Trinity, which was accompanied by a voice from within which gave her the words of a new prayer, one that began;

"Eternal Father, I offer You the Body and Blood, Soul and Divinity of Your dearly beloved Son, Our Lord Jesus Christ, in atonement for our sins and those of the whole world; for the sake of His sorrowful Passion, have mercy on us." (Diary, 475)

The more she prayed, the less power the angel had. In the visions that followed, she was instructed on how to fully pray the chaplet, and that in doing so, she was praying not just for herself, but also for the whole world. St Faustina was also told to encourage others to say the chaplet, and that those who recite it accordingly would receive 'great mercy at the hour of death.' (Diary, 687)

Praying the chaplet regularly has a multitude of benefits. As St Faustina was told, it is powerful connection between us and God's mercy, and quite a simple one at that. We aren't asked for much, but in return we get something that we could never hope to repay or buy. Furthermore, the recital of the chaplet promotes our participation in the Catholic Church, by virtue of bringing us closer to Jesus and to those around us. We enforce our relationship with God and simultaneously bring his mercy to those around us. In doing so, we carry out the mission we were given by Jesus.

On a more practical note, the Divine Mercy Chaplet is a great way to get into the habit of praying. It is a simple, yet meaningful prayer, and the use of the rosary helps keep us grounded and separate from distractions. It is also quick, so if you ever feel like you don't have much time to pray, all you need is to set aside a few minutes. The chaplet is easy to understand, but this does not detract from its meaning in any way. It is one of the most powerful prayers, and the rewards we receive from it are beyond amazing, so next time you have a few minutes, have a go at it.
