COMMENTARY

Stop Talking to Yourself!

Conversation is what makes us human: we are word animals. Anyone who has been in hospital for some time knows that it is the lack of conversation which starts to tell. We need mouth to mouth resuscitation.

Did you notice in today's Gospel that the rich landowner is constantly murmuring to himself. He poses questions which he answers. He is so bound up with his possessions that there is no room in his life for real conversation with people or with God.

In muttering to himself, the rich man was becoming dehumanised and in danger that at the moment of death, he could find himself monologuing for all eternity, and that is a Hellish existence. He, and we, need to learn the language of Heaven and we begin that on earth.

There are two partners of conversation we need: With God we call it prayer. The Our Father is the conversation of the children of God with their heavenly Father. With other people, real dialogue might reveal something about them such that we need to respond wholeheartedly.

And then, draw closer to Our Lady who was the greatest conversation partner with God: 'Be it done unto me according to Thy word.' She is constantly trying to draw us into her conversation with God.

We could pause for a moment to ask Our Lady to help us to learn and practise the language of Heaven: 'now, and at the hour of our death.' Amen.

St Joseph of Arimathea

Today marks the feast day of one particular Saint we may have heard of- St Joseph of Arimathea, known for burying Jesus' body after his crucifixion. Saint Joseph followed Jesus, but initially was not open about his beliefs, as he was a prominent Jewish leader. Moreover, he was a wellrespected and wealthy civic leader yet he showed courage in asking Pilate for Jesus' body, foregoing his social status and standing for God instead. He then buried the body in a tomb on his property – a tomb that he had likely intended to be his own. Not only did he donate his personal tomb so that Jesus could have a proper burial, but he risked his own social status by publicly declaring himself a follower of Christ. The account of Joseph of Arimathea is recorded in three of the four gospels. Matthew 27:57-60 says: "When it was evening, there came a rich man from Arimathea named Joseph, who was himself a disciple of Jesus. He went to Pilate and asked for the body of Jesus; then Pilate ordered it to be handed over. Taking the body, Joseph wrapped it [in] clean linen and laid it in his new tomb that he had hewn in the rock. Then he rolled a huge stone across the entrance to the tomb and departed.

Mark 15:43 describes him as "a distinguished member of the council" and says that he went "courageously" to Pilate. John 18:39 mentions that Nicodemus also came with him, bringing a mixture of myrrh and aloes. With this bold act, Joseph proclaimed his faith, and, as a result, the greatest miracle in history occurred in his garden. We can take inspiration from his example, and not be afraid to boldly proclaim our faith, no matter what effect it may have on our social standing. For this, St Joseph is considered the patron saint of funeral directors and pallbearers. Despite his great riches, Joseph kept his humility and was an obedient servant of Christ in his lifetime.
