
Response: God, in your goodness, you have made a home for the poor.

GOSPEL

A reading from the holy Gospel according to St Luke Lk 14: 1. 17 - 14

On a sabbath day Jesus had gone for a meal to the house of one of the leading Pharisees; and they watched him closely. He then told the guests a parable, because he had noticed how they picked the places of honour. He said this, 'When someone invites you to a wedding feast, do not take your seat in the place of honour. A more distinguished person than you may have been invited, and the person who invited you both may come and say, "Give up your place to this man." And then, to your embarrassment, you would have to go and take the lowest place. No; when you are a guest, make your way to the lowest place and sit there, so that, when your host comes, he may say, "My friend, move up higher." In that way, everyone with you at the table will see you honoured. For everyone who exalts himself will be humbled, and the man who humbles himself will be exalted.'

Then he said to his host, 'When you give a lunch or a dinner, do not ask your friends, brothers, relations or rich neighbours, for fear they repay your courtesy by inviting you in return. No; when you have a party, invite the poor, the crippled, the lame, the blind; that they cannot pay you back means that you are fortunate, because repayment will be made to you when the virtuous rise again.' This is the Gospel of the Lord.

Heaven Embossed Invitations

Hearing Our Lord's command: 'Invite the poor, the crippled, to the feast,' how do we respond as citizens of a nation which, in comparative global terms, is having a great feast? Jesus demands that we go well beyond an immigration policy which favours skilled and entrepreneurial people. They more than 'repay our courtesy' in terms of economic activity and social stability.

The majority of the poor and the crippled live in the subsistence villages, the refugee camps, and the squalor of the megacities of the Third World.

Heaven embossed invitations must be extended to such as those so that they may join in our national feast. Only then can we become the sort of people who, in the great Feast of Heaven, can join with those poor who are certain to be there.

We could pause for a moment to pray to put today's Gospel into effect so that we might hear Our Lord: 'Friend, join in the Feast. Be close to me.'

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Holy Communion Prayer

We thank you, our Father, for that life which you have made known to us by Jesus your Son, by whom you made all things, and take care of the whole world. You sent him to become man for our salvation.

You allowed him to suffer and to die. You raised him up, glorified him, and have set him at your right hand, and in Him you have promised us the resurrection of the dead. O Lord Almighty, eternal God, gather together your Church from the ends of the earth into your kingdom, as grain was once scattered, and now has become one loaf. Relativism

This month in Youth Group, we kicked off our new cycle of sessions under the umbrella topic 'The Cafeteria is Closed.' Being the first month of this topic, we considered why exactly the cafeteria was closed, and what significance this had for us as Christians.

To begin with, the cafeteria in question isn't actually a real place. Rather, it refers to the idea that in a lot of cafeterias, you are free to pick and choose what foods you want to eat, and if you don't like something you can always just throw it away. However, when the cafeteria's closed, what you have it what you get - you are stuck with it and can't change. In a similar way, when you decide to become a Catholic, you don't get to pick and choose what you believe in. You either believe in all of it, or you believe in none of it. I know it seems like such a simple thing, but the 'cafeteria catholic' - someone who only believes in what is convenient to them - is a widespread phenomenon. With so much information available to us, courtesy of the internet, it can often be hard to know what's right and what's wrong. That, in turn, brings us to an important concept known as 'relativism.'

Relativism, simply put, is the idea that all truth, morality and knowledge is relative to cultural, historical and social context. Essentially - there is no objective source of morality, truth and knowledge, are defined relative to what society says. While at first, this may seem like a good thing, it is in direct opposition to our understanding of God - because God is absolute, and all morality, truth and knowledge are only revealed to us through him, and it was him who gave us to ability to perceive such things at the time of our creation.

When we base our morality on what society says, we are liable to be easily misled. One fairly recent example is the legalisation of abortion. Society says it is correct, however, we know that in condoning such procedures, you are accepting the accompanying loss of life. It is also important to note, however, that this doesn't mean all laws are so contradictory to our faith. As humans, we are given conscience and the ability to distinguish right from wrong, and even though we may sometimes fail to heed our conscience, the majority of our laws (such as those against stealing and murder) were made with the intent to do the morally right thing.

As humans, we aren't perfect and often we are led astray. The important thing is to know what you believe in, and to know where to get the relevant information from. Relativism may be a dangerous thing, but with surety in your faith, it shouldn't be much of an issue.
