And then, when she had found it, call together her friends and neighbours? "Rejoice with me," she would say "I have found the drachma I lost." He was angry then and refused to go in, and his father came out to plead with him; but he answered his father, "Look, all these years I have slaved for you and never once disobeyed your orders, yet you never offered me so much as a kid for me to celebrate with my friends. But, for this son of yours, when he comes back after swallowing up your property he and his women – you kill the calf we had been fattening." Sinners and Archery

Rule-obsessed Pharisees complained that Jesus 'welcomes sinners and eats with them'. So, who are 'sinners'? The word commonly used in the Gospels for sin is 'hamartia' which refers to an arrow falling short of the target.

Our target is sharing in the life of God, but we often miss the mark, falling short through laziness and negligence, sometimes by deliberately shooting the arrow of our life in the wrong direction. We need the forgiveness of God, expressed in the hospitality of Jesus Christ, to encourage us to aim better.

At every Mass, we are invited to share in the re-enactment of Jesus' expert drawing of the bow, letting fly and perfectly hitting the mark in his life, death, resurrection and ascension to heavenly glory.

We could pause for a moment to pray that Jesus may encourage and empower us to be the archers we are meant to be.



The Parable of the Prodigal Son

The Parable of the Prodigal Son is probably a story told by Jesus that Catholics have heard many times. It's easy to like the story, because, in one sense, it is an uplifting story that shows how God is so willing and gracious enough to forgive sinners who have strayed from the path of holiness. When Jesus says in Luke 15:7 that there will be more joy in heaven over one sinner that does repent over ninety-nine just souls, people may think that Jesus is encouraging sinners' repentance, because it is valued and prized by God. But the story of the Prodigal Son is not just about repentant sinners. It is also about people who believe in the idea that people should receive what they deserve and feel resentment when this idea is challenged when people are seemingly rewarded for their wrongdoing through forgiveness. In the parable, the elder son of the father exemplifies this resentment because he complains that he has served his father for many years yet he has never been rewarded for his service with a party, yet the profligate younger brother is rewarded with a feast. In a sense, the elder brother shows an attitude that reflects the attitudes of the pharisees and scribes, who are somewhat critical of Jesus being open to personal interactions with sinners and dining with sinners. The pharisees and scribes believe that sinners do not deserve the respectability of even being acknowledged or reached out to because of the type of people that they are.

So doesn't God care about giving justice? Yes, of course God does. Jesus is very clear that people will be judged by God on their actions. In Matthew 25:32-46, Jesus says he will separate the righteous people from the unrighteous. Some people will be judged to be worthy of entering God's kingdom because they showed compassion to people in their lives, while people who showed indifference to other people's hardships will be cast away. So the judgement of souls will come, but that is only one aspect of God's plan. God wants people to be ready to face His judgement. It is important for people who believe that everyone should get what they deserve to remember that everyone is a sinner. People may be sinners in different respects and in different magnitudes. And some people may also have virtues, such as righteousness and a sense of duty, but personal virtues do not, by themselves, blot out sin. The fact that all people are sinners means that everyone will need the mercy and grace of God, the mercy and grace that forgives remorseful people's wrongdoing and overlooks their mistakes. If God was merely just and not merciful, then no one would be deserving to enter God's kingdom because of their sins, and Jesus would not have been sent down to earth to atone for the sins of others. It is part of the human condition to stray from holiness and righteousness or be tempted to stray. It's easy to think that we would never be as reckless as the Prodigal Son, and perhaps that is true, but you don't need to be as reckless as the prodigal son to be prone to stray from God's standards, which demand moral perfection. God's mercy is important because it helps put people on the path to righteousness, helps people return to the right path and ultimately attain salvation, in the same way the father's forgiveness of the prodigal son helps the son return to the family.
