ENTRANCE GOSPEL Mark 11:1-10

A reading from the Holy Gospel according to Mark

When they drew near to Jerusalem, to Bethphage and Bethany, at the Mount of Olives, Jesus sent two of his disciples, and said to them, 'Go into the village opposite you, and immediately as you enter it you will find a colt tied, on which no one has ever sat; untie it and bring it. If anyone says to you, "Why are you doing this?" say, "The Lord has need of it and will send it back here immediately"'. And they went away, and found a colt tied at the door out in the open street; and they untied it. And those who stood there said to them, 'What are you doing, untying the colt?' And they told them what Jesus had said; and they let them go. And they brought the colt to Jesus and threw their garments on it; and he sat upon it. And many spread their garments on the road, and others spread leafy branches which they had cut from the fields. And those who went before and those who followed cried out, 'Hosanna! Blessed is he who comes in the name of the Lord! Blessed is the kingdom of our father David that is coming! Hosanna in the highest!'

COMMENTARY

Women and War

Jesus entered Jerusalem, not as a warrior in the tradition of King David as many had hoped for, but riding simply on a donkey. The disciples and the crowd applauded him, but they proved fickle in their support.

On the other hand, Jesus remained steadfast in his commitment to non-violent revolutionary change of the religious and political systems so as to establish the reign of God. Why did he renounce marshalling human and angelic warriors to further his cause?

First, Jesus embodied God-for-us, and God does not want the destruction of those he has created out of love. Second, Jesus had a premonition that an armed revolt would lead to the destruction of Jerusalem and the dispersal of the Jewish people (as occurred in 70AD).

Third, another Gospel (Luke) recounts that as Jesus laboured up Mount Calvary he turned to some wailing women and said, 'Daughters of Jerusalem, do not weep for me, weep rather for yourselves and for your children.' He knew that they suffer grievously in armed uprising. This is seen in barbaric reality in our own time with women being tortured and raped in campaigns of terror, trafficked into sexual slavery, suffering the loss of sons, husband and lovers.

We could take a moment to pray that the Church of the 21st century, successor of the pacifist Church of the first three centuries, may enter on a new period of reflection on these issues, grappling with the desire to protect the innocent, yet always challenged by the man on a donkey, Divine Prince of Peace.

Youth + Corner

SOAP Reflection 24th March

Scripture: *He came back and found them sleeping, and he said to Peter, 'Simon, are you asleep? Had you not the strength to stay awake one hour? Stay awake and pray not to be put to the test. The spirit is willing enough, but human nature is weak.'*

Observation:

The metaphor of falling asleep to describe succumbing to temptation is used several times in the Bible to help us understand and be aware of how easy it can be to fall from God's path and victim to sin. Notably, in Mark 13:34-36, Jesus tells his disciples: 'It is like a man traveling abroad: he has gone from his home, and left his servants in charge, each with his own work to do; and he has told the doorkeeper to stay awake. So stay awake, because you do not know when the master of the house is coming, evening, midnight, cockcrow or dawn; if he comes unexpectedly, he must not find you asleep.'

In this passage, and the one from today's reading, we are reminded of the limitations of our own bodies - that though we often have the desire to follow and emulate Jesus, our human nature (in some translations, our flesh) is vulnerable to the alluring ease of sin. I'm reminded personally of the time I tried to pray before I slept, but found myself waking up with hands clasped together the next morning instead!

Application

Fortunately, Jesus does provide a solution (not necessarily to resisting the human requirement for sleep, but for the battle against temptation) which is habitual prayer! Speaking with God frequently (at least daily), listening closely to your conscience, and taking the time to reflect upon the inner movements of your heart are important tools and gifts God has given us to build our resilience to temptation. Take the moment to consider how often you really stop to listen to your heart, and contemplate upon what course of action God is calling you towards.

As in the passage from Mark 13, we each have our 'own work to do' and unique challenges to face - the temptations I face day-to-day will invariably differ from yours. However, we can be confident in knowing that our approach has been informed by Jesus himself! Like any habit, it takes patience and repetition, but as our faith grows stronger, the hold of temptation and sin will weaken.

Prayer

Dear God, I thank you for the gift of the Holy Spirit who comforts and guides me through the challenges which I face daily. Please instill in me the virtues of patience and fortitude so that I can remain near to the Sacred Heart of Jesus and resolute in the face of sin and temptation. I trust in you completely - please open my ears so that I may hear your call through the people who need my help, and open my heart so that I can respond to your call with humility and purpose. Amen!
