COMMENTARY

The Greatest Gift

When I was a boy (is it so long ago?) it was still the rule at Mass that only the priest drank from the chalice. One of the great actions of the Church over the last fifty years has been the recovery of the ancient practice of offering Holy Communion under the appearance of both bread and wine.

The reception of both the consecrated bread and the consecrated wine is in perfect harmony with today's Gospel: 'Anyone who does eat my flesh and drink my blood has eternal life.' Note the present tense: 'has' — right now! This is because, as St John Paul II put it: 'We digest, as it were, the secret of the Resurrection.'

Of course, Our Risen Lord is really present under the appearance of either the bread or the wine. For a Jew, (unlike the Greeks) the body was absolutely core to being the person one is. For a Jew, blood was identified as the life-force of any animal. So, for the Jewish Jesus, to say 'This is my body... this is my blood' was to gift us his core identity, his deepest vitality. Either the consecrated bread or consecrated wine gives us His whole life.

But to receive both the Heavenly Bread and the Spiritual Drink does enable us to more fully respond to Our Lord at the Last Supper: 'Take, eat ... take, drink'. Then the words of today's Gospel can more physically resonate in our own bodies: 'He who eats my flesh and drinks my blood lives in me and I in him.'

We could take a moment to pray in thanksgiving that we are able to join in the tradition starting with the Apostles at the Last Supper and, in doing so, to enter into Holy Communion with the only One who can embody in us the secret of His resurrection.

SOAP Reflection 18th August

Scripture: John 6:51-58

Observation: In today's gospel, Jesus says something that is incredibly provocative to the Jewish audience. He asserts that He is the bread of life that offers eternal life to those who eat His bread and drink His blood. Jesus is indicating that He will institute the sacrament of Holy Communion, which He fulfilled during the Last Supper. For Jesus, the institution of the Holy Communion is an essential element of His mission to save humanity, because it enables a spiritual union between God and believers who receive His body. When we are spiritually unified with God, we draw life from Him. However, the Jewish people don't understand this aspect of Jesus' mission because like most of humanity, they believe food nourishes the physical body, not the soul, and does not prevent mortality. But Jesus recognise that nourishing the soul is more important because the soul is eternal, and because of that, the resurrection of people to eternal life is possible. Jesus is saying that when people consume His body and drink His blood, they are also expressing a hope in that resurrection.

Application: It is important to consider what keeps us going. What motivates us and sustains us, give us enthusiasm for life and directs our thoughts and actions? Is it our family and friends? Our career and educational goals? Our interests and hobbies? While many of these interests and pursuits are worthwhile, they do not last forever and they do not necessarily give us a clear, coherent moral framework to live our lives. We should let our desire for unity with God and our salvation guide what we want and do in this life, because that will give us a better moral compass. When we take the Eucharist, it is not just a mindless, routine religious ritual that we participate in. We express our hope in the resurrection and belief in eternal life. This is why we need to verbally express this by saying 'amen' every time we receive the Eucharist. We are allowing God to change our hearts and guide our hearts and draw life from God. When we draw life from God, our hearts and minds turn towards God and away from a life consisting solely of pleasure and hedonism. As St Paul describes in Ephesians 5:15-20, we can show that our hearts and minds are turned to God by praising God and praying to Him, and, equally importantly, being careful and righteous in our decision making.

Prayer: Dear God, please help us to always pay attention to and recognise the power of the Eucharist in our spiritual lives. Whenever we take the Eucharist, may we do it with thoughtfulness, reverence and sincerity in our desire for spiritual unity with you and for personal transformation. May you always be our moral guide, who influences our every thought, desire and actions, so that our spiritual unity with you is always strengthened.
