COMMENTARY

Holiness: Contagion not Quarantine

Many religious leaders have thought that some foods or some people are such a threat to the holiness of their followers that contact with 'unclean', 'defiling' foods or people must be avoided. Our Lord was totally opposed to the idea that holiness was something secured or gained by being quarantined or separated from any-thing or any-person.

On the contrary, he could touch a leper or have a meal with a prostitute. Rather than defilement flowing from the leper or prostitute to Jesus, his life flowed into them repairing their broken humanity, healing them bodymindspirit, holistically, making them holy.

The fact is that God, embodied in Jesus Christ, is contagious. The contagion of Divine Life is meant to flow into the inner depths of personality, into the heart. When this occurs, the Divine Life in the human person causes 'holiness'.

We have to strive to put ourselves in the way of this contagion. We become holy when we allow ourselves to be touched by our Lord Jesus Christ. How do we do this?

By hearing of His life in the Gospel, by being nourished by His life in Holy Communion, by being touched by the plight of those in whom He is to be found. St James in the second reading describes some who are particularly vulnerable in a patriarchal society with no social security system: the widows and orphans. No doubt, we can identify equivalent groups in our own society and overseas.

We could take a moment to pray that we might more conscious of the Holy Spirit germinating something in our hearts, making us holy from the inside out, that our holiness be authenticated by good works so that we may be holy as the Lord our God is holy.

Scripture: Mark 7

Observation:

In today's gospel reading, Jesus, after being provoked, calls out the Pharisees after they insinuate that his followers failed to adhere to traditions and were thus unclean. There are two things in this passage that really stand out. First is the fact that Jesus creates a strong divide between the commandments of God and human tradition. This particular exchange is reminiscent of Jesus denouncing those who like to make it known they are fasting and praying in order to heighten their image of devoutness. Though we follow the word of God, we are only human and at times we may find our priorities confused and not aligned with what God really wants for us. This is true for the individual and as history has shown, even sometimes for the Church. The second thing is Jesus proclamation that what defiles us is the filth and evil that comes from within our own hearts. It is really easy to overlook our own faults, and a lot of the time we are satisfied if we believe we are doing better than those around us. However, according to Jesus, it is our own tendency to sin which is the most pressing issue - the biggest obstacle between us and eternal life in Heaven. While this is no real revelation, it is still extremely important, and something that often gets lost within the rush of everyday life.

Application:

Our faith is not something we are meant to parade around. In a similar fashion, it is also not purely measured by the practices or traditions we adhere to. While you will often hear (and I'm sure many of us heard this during religious education or formation) that you should find a quiet place to pray and that you should have specific times set aside, this may not be the best for everyone. For some people, prayer might be something that naturally comes to them while doing other things, or while actively living out God's mission. What's important is that we, in whatever form, continue to deepen our relationship with God.

Finally, do not be too focussed on what others around you think, that you fail to see your own problems. It is so easy to compare yourself to another, or use them as a benchmark, but what really matters is how we develop our own faith, and how we can then bring that faith to those around us.

Prayer:

Dear God, please provide me the strength to grow in spiritual maturity and deepen my understanding of You. Help me be humble and ready to change, so that my actions better reflect Your love. Please bring people into my life who can help me become more like You each day. Like Jesus did, so too help me to live your mission in my daily life. Amen.
