

COMMENTARY

Marginal people

Jesus was well aware of the constant temptation for the leaders amongst his followers to be conditioned by the surrounding social and political structures. So, when he became aware that his disciples were disputing 'who is the greatest', he decided to teach them a lesson by engaging in some countercultural street theatre.

Jesus saw a young boy on the edge of the crowd and beckoned him into the middle of his group of disciples. This was not because of some sentimental idea that all kids are little innocents, but because in his society, children were absolutely at the bottom of the social scale. Jesus moved an utter nobody from the margins of society to the centre, challenging his disciples to change their perspective.

This challenge is made to all of us. We must identify those on the margins, some of whom we have quite literally dislocated like indigenous communities or asylum seekers, and bring them into the centre of our concern. There may be pain, personal and social, in changing perspective.

We might pause for a moment to pray for a new way of seeing, for perseverance in re-locating someone in the centre of our concerns, for the graceful insight that in welcoming that person we have welcomed Christ. PRAYER FOR THE DIOCESAN PASTORAL PLAN

SOAP Reflection 22nd September

Scripture: Mark 9:30-37, with verse 37 "Whoever welcomes one of these little children in my name welcomes me, and whoever welcomes me does not welcome me but the one who sent me," being the most impactful

Observation:- In this passage, Jesus predicts his death for a second time. We can witness his disciples arguing over what the hierarchy of power could potentially look like when Jesus establishes his Kingdom, but Jesus redirects their focus. Instead, he takes a child in his arms, analogous to the way he might embrace us or others when they are weak and vulnerable, and states the importance of caring for those who are less fortunate than us, or can offer very little in return. This lesson is therefore not just applicable to young children, but extends to those in poverty, sickness, and absence of a strong faith or belief in Christ. When the disciples are given opportunities to do so, they are serving God and acting in Jesus' name- that is, being a representative of his love and obedience by caring for those the way Jesus would have. In a way, it also shows the disciples' willingness to listen and accept the true power and authority of Christ.

Application- Today's gospel is a great reminder to live out one of the most fundamental values within our Christian faith- to love and serve others the way Jesus did. It is a good way to stop and consider the people who require the most assistance. In our daily life, it could be a homeless individual you pass by often but have never sought the courage to speak or provide for them; or taking up that volunteering opportunity you have been putting off to truly make an impact in others' lives. It can be very easy to get caught up in our own bubble and forget the world is significantly larger, with millions of people everywhere. When we have been granted a chance from God to do something meaningful in our lives (even if it is something small, like giving money to someone on the street), we should embrace thisafter all, we have been called to serve in Jesus' name. We should always strive to love and care for others, even if they are complete strangers because this is what Jesus would have done.

Prayer- Dear Heavenly Father, thank you for teaching us the importance of love and service, and for showing us that a true leader is one who does not desire power, but one who guides and leads the people, only wanting what is best for them. I pray that I may be able to emulate you in my daily life, and may I be more attentive to your calling so that I can readily act upon it. In moments where I do experience doubt or hesitation, please give me strength to overcome my fears and remind myself who I am doing this for, and who I am representing. In Jesus' name I pray, Amen.
