Scripture: Luke 6:39-45

Observation:

One of the main takeaways from this month's gospel is to self-reflect. Jesus tells us through the parable that we should not judge others, as we ourselves are sinners. He teaches us that we need to self-reflect and understand where we fall short before we begin to think about how others fall short. If we do not understand our faults and try to guide someone else, we will lead them astray. "Can the blind lead the blind? Will they not both fall into the pit?" Jesus then tells a parable about a tree and what fruit it bears. It's a clear reminder that what we hold in our hearts, is reflected in the actions which we take. It goes along with the general theme of self-reflection of the first half as we must self-reflect on our own thoughts, desires and attitudes and discern how those affect how we act. We cannot think one thing and do the opposite, our mind and our actions are one.

Application:

One of the best ways to apply this Gospel is to conduct an examination of conscience. An examination of conscience is a silent meditation on the past, where you can reflect on how you may have sinned. After conducting one, you may also wish to visit confession. Here are a few to start with:

Do I give time every day to God in prayer? Do I make Sunday a day of prayer or rest? Have I used foul or ugly language? Have I wished evil on another?

Do I say cruel things, or make fun of others to hurt their feelings?

Do I treat my body and other people's bodies with purity and respect?

Do I tell lies to make myself look good?
