FIRST READING Exodus 17:8-13 A reading from the book of Exodus

The Amalekites came and attacked Israel at Rephidim. Moses said to Joshua, 'Pick out men for yourself, and tomorrow morning march out to engage Amalek. I, meanwhile, will stand on the hilltop, the staff of God in my hand.' Joshua did as Moses told him and marched out to engage Amalek, while Moses and Aaron and Hur went up to the top of the hill. As long as Moses kept his arms raised, Israel had the advantage; when he let his arms fall, the advantage went to Amalek. But Moses arms grew heavy, so they took a stone and put it under him and on this he sat, Aaron and Hur supporting his arms, one on one side, one on the other; and his arms remained firm till sunset. A reading from the holy Gospel according to Luke



Think of what widows in Ukraine or ever. Gaza are praying for tonight. Then think of one's own prayer. God is not the slightest bit interested in my usual trivial, self-promoting prayers. But He is interested in my being such a woeful pray-er and wants to change me.

Recall an incident of really urgent, intense prayer. Most likely, it was to do with a traumatic accident or fatal disease of a baby, of a spouse, of a parent too young. Apply that intense urgency to those in the world crying out: 'give us this day our daily bread'. In short, pray The Lord's Prayer with meaning.

We could pause for a moment to pray to live out the consequences of the 'Our Father' lest we are threatened with a black eye!



Scripture: Luke 18: 1-8

Observation: The parable Jesus tells in today's Gospel can be described as very thought-provoking underdog story. Back in Jesus's time, widows were usually found at lower end Jewish society, with very little influence or privilege. Judges, on the other hand, could be as corrupt as they wanted to be and rarely worried about the consequences. This is especially true of the judge depicted in today's Gospel, who is so uncaring and unjust that you'll wonder how he even ended up as a judge in the first place. Even though the parable is short, we can still infer a lot about his character; he is selfish, unsympathetic, and the complete opposite of the perfect and infinitely loving judge that God is. In the end though, the judge still ends up changing his mind to help the seemingly powerless widow with her appeal, not because he felt sorry for her, but because she was so persistent that he feared he'd be physically attacked.

Application: Today's Gospel warns us about the end times, when most people will be so consumed by Earthly concerns that they abandon God. This isn't sometime in the far future – it's actually happening now. As Catholics in this era of growing distrust in God and his plans, we will undoubtedly face many trials and sufferings, but we mustn't lose our faith. Just like the widow in today's Gospel, we may sometimes feel powerless, but remember: Jesus will never forget about you, and he hears every single one of your concerns. This is why it's important to pray, not just when you feel like you need something from God, but constantly, even when those around you fall away from him. Jesus's question at the end of today's Gospel, "will he find faith on Earth?" is to get you to think: when all hope is lost, will you give up or will you keep clinging to God? Because if even a selfish and unfair judge agrees to help such a persistent widow, God will most definitely help you if you just keep persisting.

Prayer: Heavenly father, help me to be as faithful and persevering as the widow in today's Gospel. Help me to continue trusting in your perfect sense of justice, even when the world around me grows cold. Let this draw me closer to you and strengthen my hope in your promise that we will one day be forever united with you. In your son's name, we pray. Amen.
